Year 6 Information Events

We were delighted to welcome over 100 families to our recent Transition Information Events. On Thursday 7th March visitors heard from members of the Leadership Team and Student Ambassadors, including a current Year 7 student, about our Transition Programme and being a student at The Halley Academy.

"When I first started at the academy I didn't know many of the other students but we took part in a range of different activities, working collaboratively in aroups. This enabled me to make friends very quickly with students from different backgrounds and cultures and we all showed respect to each other. A large part of my successful transition has been the middle years programme. In lessons and during tutor time, we have been learning about the IB learner profile attributes and how to demonstrate them. I especially like the attribute of being a risk taker and have recently demonstrated this in Spanish by trying an activity I haven't done before. During tutor time we are studying Japanese language acquisition and Japanese culture, enabling me to become more knowledgeable and open-minded." Nicholas, 7T2

On 14th March, we invited families to tour the academy and get a real feel for our day to day teaching and learning. One parent said The Halley Academy *"was one of the quietest secondary schools she'd visited."*

We had some wonderfully positive feedback from both events:

"When I found out we had been allocated The Halley Academy, I had some reservations. However, the efficiency with which we were invited in to meet key staff following National Offer Day reassured me. I found the event to be very informative and professional and we were able to take away important literature to read in our own time." The event was professional and detailed the very comprehensive transition programme offered at The Halley Academy. In addition, we heard about the transition experiences of a current Year 7 student; this especially reassured my daughter."

Our Year 7 tutors play an essential role in the smooth transition into secondary school life. Ms Camara and Ms Ade-Davis wanted to share their thoughts on their Year 7 tutor groups:

"Seeing my tutees every morning and setting up the day positively is one of the highlights of my days at The Halley Academy. My tutees in 7T2 are always caring and supportive towards one another. They are also inquisitive, as they are not afraid to ask questions and to learn more about the world around us. They are really communicative and caring, we are here for one another. As an MFL teacher with English as a Second Language, they are always considerate and happy to support me and even teach me a few idioms. In our tutor group we appreciate our differences and we celebrate each of our achievements here at the academy. I like the idea of our tutor group being a small family within a bigger family, where we can be ourselves and meet each morning in a warm, friendly atmosphere.

I also believe it is a rewarding experience to support students during their transition from primary school to secondary school and to see them grow each and every day, striving for independence and thriving to become the best version of themselves." Anti-Knife Crime Summit



On 14 February 2019, a select group of The Halley Academy students were invited to attend the Anti-Knife Crime Summit: Choose Life, Not The Knife at Charlton Athletic Football Ground as part of the Greenwich Young People's Council. In addition to the opportunity to learn how to keep our young people and each other safe, there was a chance to ask the Chief Superintendent for the Borough and the Leader of Greenwich Council vital questions relating to their work around safety and protection in the borough.

We were proud to see a previous student and local musician Romzy (Romario) on the panel of experts speaking up against knife crime and encouraging positive action among the young people present.

Those in attendance learned about of the legal implications around carrying a knife, medical intervention if someone has been a victim of a knife attack, and worked on community responses to current issues with another youth rapper and anti-knife crime activist.

Our students were articulate and fully engaged with the activities during the day. The summit addressed many issues that affect our youth, not just locally, but nationally and offered excellent insight into how we can work together to stay safe and protect ourselves and each other.

The Halley Academy Social Action Group Visit Gordon Primary School

Following their success at the borough anti-bullying conference in November, The Halley Academy Social Action group were invited to Gordon Primary School in Eltham to deliver an assembly to over 120 Year 5 and Year 6 students followed by a workshop on Wednesday 20 March.

The group delivered an assembly focused on how we can all choose respect and prevent others from being bullied, as well as explaining the impact bullying can have on victims in later life.

Immediately after the assembly, The Halley Academy Social Action Group led a workshop with a group of Year five students. The primary school students were split into small groups and worked together to discuss and decide on their own definition of respect, creating a 'Respect Wall'.

Following this, the Year 5 students had the opportunity to create a dramatic piece which demonstrated bullying behaviour and they then discussed how to report and prevent bullying. The Halley Academy Social Action Group were very impressed with how well the Year 5 students engaged with the workshop.

The Halley's Heroes

Our Year 9 and Year 10 Halley's Heroes are continuing to work hard with their weekly peer-mentoring of Year 7 to support them through a smooth transition to secondary school. This module as part of their independent student leadership project, the Year 9 Halley's Heroes have been working with Katie Evans at Humanutopia to develop 'Icons' workshops to deliver to Year 7 during modules 5 and six. This has given the Heroes the opportunity to reflect on their ongoing peer-mentoring sessions to evaluate the progress our Year 7 students have made during their transition to secondary school. The Heroes have been very impressed with the respect and resilience our Year 7 students have shown this year, and want them to develop this further as they move into Year 8.

Over the course of modules 5 and 6 the Year 9 Halley's Heroes will deliver 'lcon' workshops to Year 7, enabling them to identify their inspirations, reflect on their first year at The Halley Academy and set targets for the beginning of Year 8.

Year 11 Breakfast Masterclasses

As we approach the beginning of the 2019 GCSE examination season, it is important to remember that our Year 11s have had over 25 weeks of teaching this year. Which, before we add in interventions and revision time spent at home equates to over 750 hours of learning to ensure they are prepared for their examinations, something which should serve them in confidence for this final push

The Year 11s are currently working hard towards their first exams, with their most recent Pre-Public Examinations (PPE's) demonstrating an excellent work ethic and dedication to their studies.

Year 12 Psychology

Year 12 psychology students are currently learning about brain lateralisation; how different tasks are split over our two brain hemispheres. Whilst brain surgery carried out by A Level students would usually be frowned upon, the students still got to examine the cerebral cortex by making their own 'brain hats'! This helped to highlight the areas involved in the processing of language, information processing and our senses. When presented with case studies of real-life brain surgery patients, students were able to inspect their own brains and draw links between lateralisation and the behaviour they were witnessing.



During the PPE's, the academy held 'Breakfast Masterclasses' each morning from 8am to ensure students were prepared for their exams. Students were provided with a free breakfast and curriculum teams spent the morning working with the students to close their most common examination misconceptions.

We will be holding a Breakfast Masterclass each morning during the examination season to ensure our students feel fuelled and ready to sit their exams.



Walking Talking Mocks

We have launched the first in a series of 'Walking Talking Mocks' with our Year 11 cohort this Module. The mocks are designed to guide students through their GCSE examination papers using subject experts. The sessions are held in exam conditions and staff are on hand to support students when they need it. We will be holding these with all subjects as we draw closer to the beginning of the GCSE examination season.

Students engaged in discussions developing their ideas of racism and their understanding of why unfortunately it does exist, before they learned about some poignant examples of discrimination that have occurred within history. The final part of the day culminated in our Year 8s having the opportunity to listen to our guest speaker, Alex Holmes. He was an inspiration to our students, retelling us his personal experiences and how



he overcame the obstacles that he faced. The students were engaged throughout the morning and were a credit to the academy.

We are now looking forward to the Year 9 drop down day, where we will have the opportunity to welcome a Holocaust survivor to the academy.

CBRE All Schools Rugby Shirt Design and Reveal

In October 2018, three students from The Halley Academy took a trip to Twickenham to take part in a design workshop courtesy of the global real estate agent CBRE and the sports clothing company, Canterbury, who make all the kits for England rugby. At this workshop students learnt the rules of the game, how rugby kits are designed and made, the safety behind the design and had the opportunity to design their very own rugby shirt bespoke to The Halley Academy.

On Saturday 9th March 2019, CBRE and Canterbury invited one of our students back to represent The Halley Academy at Twickenham for the big shirt reveal during the England vs Italy Six Nations match. As part of the reveal, Darren, one of The Halley Academy's year 10 students, took part in a parade around the pitch in front of 82,000 spectators bearing a flag, whilst wearing The Halley Academy design.

Year 10 Football Semi-Final

The Franklin School Charity Challenges:

We are launching two exciting incentives to raise funds for our two local charities.

The Trussell Trust Challenge:

Following the success of the Year 10 'Halley's Heroes Helping the Homeless' project in December 2018 when we donated over twenty bags of food and clothing to our local homeless charity, Emmaus, we are building on the generosity of our students, their families and our staff to support the Trussell Trust.

From the start of module 5, we will be collecting donations of the following:
