I am delighted to announce that following an eighteenmonth candidacy and extensive authorization process, The Halley Academy is now an IB World School.

This is a fantastic achievement and allows the school to proceed with delivering the high-quality, internationally recognised courses and qualifications offered by the International Baccalaureate. This includes the IB Career-related Programme (IBCP) which will be offered to Post-16 students from September.

The International Baccalaureate aims to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who help to create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and respect. To this end the organization works with schools, governments and international organizations to develop challenging programmes of international education and rigorous assessment. These programmes encourage students across the world to become active, compassionate and lifelong learners who understand that other people, with their differences, can also be right.

For students, the IB programmes we are delivering empower them to lead their own learning and critically consider the world around them. The IB learner profile, which sits at the heart of all IB courses, identifies ten attributes that students will develop over the course of their IB education and which lead them to become more internationally minded and more prepared to take their place in an increasingly globalized and rapidly changing world. Characteristics such as inquiry, reflection, integrity and open-mindedness are instilled across all subject areas and help students develop strong academic, social and emotional qualities. For the Academy, recognition as an IB World School grants us membership to a global network of over 4,700 schools. IB World Schools share a common philosophy - a commitment to improve the teaching and learning of a diverse and inclusive community of students by delivering challenging, high quality programmes of international education that share a powerful vision.

The journey does not end here, as The Halley Academy is a candidate school for the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme as well. We are already delivering this programme to Year 7, and will launch it with Year 8 in September. We are proud to be offering the IBCP, a course offer which prepares students for the various challenges of life outside school whilst enabling them to pursue any pathway they so choose: academic, vocational, or employment.

Moreover, as part of The Halley Academy's Sixth Form Careers, Education, Information Advice and Guidance Programme, our Year 12 students have attended a variation of employment and progression insight visits (supporting their knowledge and appreciation) of the real world of employment, apprenticeships and university options.

Hawking School and the IBCP

Following The Halley Academy's authorization as an IB World School, Hawking School will be offering the International Baccalaureate Career-related Programme (IBCP) to Sixth Form students from September 2019 as an alternative to A-Levels.

This flexible course was launched in 2006 and is recognised by employers, apprenticeship providers and national and international universities. Its unique approach allows students to complete a career-related technical qualification (BTEC or similar) alongside more traditional academic subjects and a core suite of courses designed to build students' transferable skills and prepare them for the challenges of higher education, employment or training.

The IB is a world-renowned educational organisation and the IBCP programme ensures students can compete with candidates and graduates from around the world. It encourages young people to look beyond the borders of their own communities or experiences to explore and engage with the wider world. It is a fantastic opportunity for the school and our students, and we are excited to be delivering it. Students were offered a range of taster workshops delivered by academics and student ambassadors, including Engineering, Business, Humanities, Maths, Science, Sports and more. The day allowed students to experience a lecture and interactive engineering workshop, talk to student ambassadors and find out about the wide range of support available at the university.


Apprentice or University: Who knows?

The below was written by Georgia in Year 12 in response to her visit to Apprentice 19 – Guildhall.

Some people may see apprenticeships as worthless and a waste of time, and university as the only option for students once they leave school. However, apprenticeships give young adults a chance to get a degree but also gain training and experience for jobs in the future. Perhaps university doesn't offer that type of experience to its students but an alternative developmental experience. Initially, my mind was set on university as the only thing for me to do when I left school but now who knows? Apprentice 19 showed us the exciting and varied options available to students after Sixth Form College.

Earlier this month, a group of sixth form students attended Guildhall in London for the Apprentice 19 exhibition event. This was so we could take a look at the different opportunities available to us after leaving college.

If you believe that university is the only way to get a degree for your dream job, you may be missing out on amazing chances to better your future. This event showed me that perhaps university isn't the only right choice for me and I would also benefit from an apprenticeship. It was a very interesting, insightful trip. Lots of people should have the same chance as us and be able to find out information they may not have known previously.



Since I was 12, I have always aspired to be a lawyer and I always thought I had to go to university in order to get a law degree to achieve my dream job. What I didn't think about was the experience I would need. Without experience, the chance of me becoming a lawyer is much lower than someone who already has experience and training in that area.

So why would I limit myself like that? Would you? Apprentice 19 opened a gate I never knew was there for me to walk through. My teachers were the ones who made that gate available to me. I was able to see that there are many law apprenticeships out there. I just need to find the right one for me. I found that I can still get that law degree but also the experience and training to boost my job prospects in the future.

Apprentice 19... This event has really opened up my mind to a range of new possibilities and opportunities. I am so grateful I had the chance to do this. I see there is much more out there for me. However, university does offer new life experiences, a chance to make incredible new friends and to really learn how to live and look after yourself. Perhaps it does not offer the experience of job training like apprenticeships do but you gain experience in other aspects of life which will be extremely helpful when you are older and are maybe living alone. So who knows what will happen when I visit universities and which path I will take?

Teaching and Learning

The Halley Academy Staff have been engaged in a number of exciting activities throughout our CPD training on Wednesday afternoons again this module. The highlight of all of these has been the recognition of all our hard work in achieving the International Baccalaureate World School accreditation. To develop our work in MYP and IB we held a session on Academic Honesty: MYP, Approaches to Teaching and Learning and the Interdisciplinary Project. We are all very excited to continue on our IB journey. This will include some sessions on curriculum planning and assessment. This module, the drive in our CPD sessions has been on the importance of collaborative planning.

As an IB authorised school, this is now more integral to our teaching and learning and has allowed the staff body to appreciate how the best and most creative ideas do not just materialise in isolation. Another highlight of the module was our 'Bring and Brag' session, which allowed all staff to share best practice amongst ourselves in a speed dating format. It was an entertaining and engaging half hour, which allowed us to display the best practice from around the academy. Mr. Stober and Ms. Johnson have continued to deliver a range of CPD sessions from the LAT Teach Programme which are being very well received.

Humanities

Following on from the success of our Year 8 drop down day, we have had two further days, involving the Year 7s and the Year 9s.

The Year 9s had a day looking at the background and build up to the Holocaust, which involved the systematic killing of 6 million Jews from around Europe. The students explored what is meant by genocide, persecution and discrimination, involving themselves in a number of dialogues that allowed all to appreciate what has happened in the past and appreciating the problems that still exist in the world today. The Year 9 students rounded off their day by watching 'The Boy in Striped Pyjamas', which allowed us to discuss the inaccuracies involved in this film and the usefulness of film within history. Meanwhile, during module 6, our Year 7s had their drop down day exploring faiths around the world. We had a variety of different speakers invited to the academy, representing a variety of religions from; Islam, Judaism, Christianity, Buddhism to Humanism. Many of these speakers have returned to the academy for the past couple of years and have remained impressed with the maturity, courtesy and engagement of our students. This year, our students continued to display their positivity and were a credit to the academy.



Culture in a Box

To round off their first year at The Halley Academy, Year 7 and 8 will be taking part in an exciting MYP interdisciplinary project in humanities called 'Culture in a Box'. As part of this project, students will consider what makes up a culture before creating their own 'culture capsules' with what they feel represents British culture. Students will present their favourite part of their capsules as part of a competition. One winner from each class will have their cultural item included in a box that we will be sending to some international partner schools! We hope to receive boxes from other cultures so that our students can explore these in the next academic year.

Sports

This year has been an incredibly successful year and a year of enormous change. We have introduced the Middle Years' Programme in Year 7 which has allowed for collaboration across the Trust. At the Halley Academy we have changed to a small school structure which has reformed the way we run inter-school competitions and entered a wider variety of sports competitions.

Cross Country

At the start of the year all students participated in a cross country qualifier in which the top 5 are selected to represent The Halley Academy at the Greenwich Borough Championships. A few notable performances from Paige, Nisrene, Ayub and Junior who placed in the top ten and were chosen to enter the next stage representing Greenwich.

Volleyball

At the start of this school year, we set up for the first time ever, a volleyball club. Every week, around 20 Year 8 and Year 7 students got together to learn about volleyball and practice their spiking skills.

The Volleyball Club faced some of the members of staff for the Women's International Day celebrations and also took part in some friendly matches throughout the course of this year.



In October, fourteen Year 8 girls represented our academy in our first ever London Youth Games Volleyball competition and they were brilliant. Our academy was second in this competition and proved that they have passion for the sport.

Football

We have had a fantastic turnout this year for both boys and girls football. Year 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 were all entered into 4 different competitions: The English Schools cup, Inner London Competition, Blackheath District Cup and Kent Schools trophy. Year 7 drew some really difficult fixtures, facing some harsh losses but also claiming some well fought victories. We have some very promising young talents in the squad and could happily field both A and B teams due to the popularity of the extra-curricular club and the quality of the players in regular attendance. I would like to thank all the players involved this year for their commitment, dedication, and hard work, with the same faces returning every week, even after the school season of fixtures has ended. They have shown their desire and determination to develop as a squad and have individually developed resilience and leadership, with a number of students stepping up to captain the side at fixtures. The boys have represented the Halley Academy extremely well with integrity and respect. I look forward to working with the squad in the next academic year and I am just as determined as they are to bring home some silverware.

Notably the Year 10 and 11 both made the semi final stages for the Blackheath District Cup; and the Year 11s making the semi finals of the Inner London Cup also. Unfortunately, neither could secure their place in the final but we look forward to next year.

The Year 7 girls football team has gone from strength to strength with numbers continuing to increase. It is really pleasing to see so many young girls taking up football and returning each week, playing with smiles on their faces. We may even have a few future Lionesses on our hands. Thank you to each of you for your hard work and commitment, let's hope for some fixture success next year.

Year 8 and Year 9 girls also entered in to the Kent Cup and Blackheath Cup but unfortunately faced tough opposition and were unable to progress to the later stages. They have, however, worked really well with the Year 7 team and have dedicated time to coaching them and developing their skills. It has been very valuable for the girls just starting out to have some positive role models from the older age groups and to receive peer feedback.

Miss Elliot and Miss Quintino are finalising details to host a girls indoor league that will be focusing on year groups 7, 8 and 9, so keep your eyes peeled and come to the PE Office to get involved.

Sports day

This year we had a very successful sports day, whereby our three small schools competed against each other for the prestigious sports day trophy. A record number of students took part in the event with many students stepping up their level of competition. The support on the day was phenomenal with all the small schools creating their own banners to cheer on the participants.





The Modern Languages department is running an exciting intercultural project through E-Twinning as part of the Language Acquisition MYP course. We are currently awaiting letters from Year 7 students from Collège Paul Fort in Dijon, France, to which our Year 7 students will respond in French.

Students will initially learn about the French students' personalities, hobbies and school environment, and our students will share this information in their own letters*. In Year 8, students from The Halley and Collège Paul Fort will then explain and describe the traditional celebratory foods of their culture, sharing images, descriptions and recipes via post and the online E-twinning platform. This will give students a chance to read and listen to the authentic language of students of their own age, and to learn about different cultures and celebrations.

We are really excited to receive the first letters and looking forward to continuing this project in September.

*Please note care will be taken to ensure students do not disclose sensitive information in these letters and everything will be GDPR compliant.






A notable performance on the day was Mubarak who has recently run 12.0 seconds in the 100m demonstrated his enormous talent to the school winning his 200m race in style.

Maths Mastery



All our Year 7 students participated in a numeracy event on Monday 8th July. The main purpose of the event was:

- To change the culture of thinking around numeracy
- To make real-life connections with numeracy
- To understand how numeracy can affect life choices
- To connect with other subjects

Action, Change and Equality

In April 2019, three members of the ACE (Action, Change and Equality) participation network attended a national event hosted by the Council for Disabled Children in Central London. Jordan represented The Halley Academy DSP.

The conference was for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities. The conference allowed the ACE group members to meet individuals and participation groups from all over England. The aim of the day was to learn about why having a voice matters, discuss experiences of participation, and inspire each other to get involved in decision-making. It was a great day with lots to talk about and our ACE members all did amazingly well!

ACE groups enable children and young people within the Royal Borough of Greenwich to share their opinions on what is working and what could be better in the Borough. The feedback from the ACE groups helps to shape and improve services for disabled children and young people.

ACE groups are currently held in seven different schools and DSPs within the Royal Borough of Greenwich – consulting with a total of 40 young people on average each month. All the different schools have supported RBG in this venture with identifying students, accommodation and support staff who are involved directly in sessions.

Halley's Heroes Year 6 Induction Day

As part of their ongoing independent student leadership project, the Halley's Heroes supported the Year 6 Induction Day on Wednesday 3rd July. Proudly wearing their Team Heroes high-visibility vests, the thirteen Year 9/10 Heroes guided the new students through team building skills, a taster lesson and sports activities. The highlight of the day was when the Heroes delivered their own session to the Year 6 students. The session focussed on ice-breaker activities and the story of the Golden Buddha, enabling the Year 6 students to identify the best version of themselves and create a bucket list for the end of Year 11. The Heroes also designed a booklet for the Year 6 students to record these ideas and as a memento of the day.

Social Action Group visit Police Cadets

In June, The Halley Academy Social Action Group delivered workshops in misogyny and sexism to the Panda and Junior Police Cadets at Eltham Police Station. The Panda workshop was delivered by the younger members of the Social Action Group to the cadets who are aged between 7 and 9. This workshop was centred around the theme of respect, one of The Halley Academy values. The cadets were given the opportunity to discuss personal experiences and develop a pledge for how they will support young people to choose respect when working with each other. The Junior Cadets, aged from 10 to 11, worked with the older members of the Social Action Group to create definitions of the words safety and security and then identified the differences between misogyny and sexism. This was a fantastic opportunity for the Social Action Group to address any misconceptions and hear real life experiences from the cadets. Their final activity was to create a charter for their Police cadet work moving forward.

Halley's Heroes HARmony Summer Transition Camp



This year, The Halley Academy are delighted to announce that for the first time we will be running a fully-funded HARmony Summer Transition Camp from 29-31 July 2019 for up to 80 of our new Year 7 students joining us in September 2019.

During the three days, 22 of our Year 9 and Year 10 Halley's Heroes will donate their time to deliver a programme at the academy based around the Humanutopia values of honesty, awareness and responsibility. With the support of the Humanutopia staff, Ms Williamson and Ms Beswick, the Heroes have been given the opportunity to be creative and develop their leadership skills by designing and running the following workshops for our new Year 7 students:

- Drama: learn new skills and work in groups to create your own play
- Arts and Crafts: learn new skills and copy the style of your favourite artist to create your own masterpiece
- Food Technology: learn some new recipes and create a special dish to share with your friends and family
- Sport: learn new football skills from one of our experts and take part in a tournament
- Dance: learn new dance skills and create a performance for your friends and family
- Athletics: learn new skills and take part in a competition

On 20 May, our Halley's Heroes were trained by the Humanutopia team in how to design engaging and team-building workshops for the three days. The Heroes have been given the opportunity to develop essential life skills as part of the HARmony Camp training and a number of them have taken on additional responsibilities by becoming HARmony Camp Directors, workshop leaders, home-group leaders and resources/ administration leaders. This will enable them to support, manage and mentor the group of Heroes in the lead up to and during the camp. These Heroes will then work with our new Year 7 students over the three days.

The camp will begin at 10am every morning and finish at 2:45pm. On the final day, there will be a celebration for families to see the Year 7's hard work, and to meet some of the Halley's Heroes who will continue to support them through their transition.
