Service Learning Project at The Halley Academy

The Leigh Academies Trust Excellence Charter includes a commitment to developing pupils' characters and attributes in line with the International Baccalaureate Learner Profile so that all LAT alumni obtain a collection of desirable qualities before they leave school (LAT Excellence Charter 4).

First of all, I would like to talk about Service Learning which is one of the cores within the IBCP (International Baccalaureate Careers Programme). Service Learning is a lesson about how we can help our local and global communities by learning how we can put our plans into action. In class we all planned how we can help our local communities. For example, I planned to be a teacher assistant for the lower school and I have helped my French teacher's Year 11 French class with their speaking. My favourite part of service learning is that it already ties in with our daily lives (I enjoy teaching French and feel that it will benefit me as I want to become fluent and teach it in the future) and it gives us opportunities to do things that we want to help in by coming up with our own projects. 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IB Global Conference 2019 Abu Dhabi



IB Global Conference in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates, held at the Abu Dhabi National Exhibition Centre from 24 – 26 October 2019.

Ms R McHaran along with Mr M Gore (Principal At Wilmington Academy) and Mrs J Tipple (Principal of the Oaks Primary Academy) from the Leigh Academies Trust, attended the IB Global Conference in Abu Dhabi over the half term break.

Following winning a Leigh Academies Trust competition to attend the conference, colleagues had the opportunity to share the Trust and individual academies' inspiring story within the IB community consisting of 2,000 members from 80 countries.

Mr Gore said 'The IBCP and MYP journey continues to be transformational for the students and staff at Wilmington Academy. Networking at this global stage ensures that the academy is at the cutting-edge of education and will continue to positively shape the lives of students from the Trust.'

As part of the schedule the team were interviewed for a South Korean TV Documentary to support schools in the country in setting up their own IB programmes.

Sir Clive Woodward, The Rugby World Cup winning Head Coach who led the England team to World Cup glory in Australia in 2003 was a keynote speaker at the conference. He discussed his inspiring experiences, thoughts and views on leadership and shared some key strategies that ensure top performance from a range of different teams and settings. His take home message was 'I never lose - I either win or I learn' - a mantra we hope our academy community and the current England rugby team will benefit from. Dr Siva Kumari - IB Director General discussed new initiatives and current issues within teaching and learning drawing from the global perspective. Ultimately her message was underpinned by the philosophy of the IB which is ensuring our students, 'who are the next wave of humanity - care about the world and engage with the communities'. The power of the IB programmes and learner profile is such that students within this framework have the opportunity to engage with this philosophy so that they can embody our motto - 'together we inspire, learn and achieve'. Our first IBCP Sixth Form students are proof of this already with their upcoming Christmas shoebox appeal.

Mrs Tipple said 'The introduction of the IBPYP at Oaks Primary Academy has meant that we are able to progress with our revised curriculum much more rapidly and should achieve where we want to be 10 years ahead of schedule should we have continued on our own. It was enlightening to understand more about the learning that is happening in Secondary and Post 16 through the MYP and CP programmes and how the programmes continue the philosophy all the way through a students education. I got to see how all of the IB programmes can and do translate across multinational curriculum's and cultures and the important impact that IB is having in LAT academies. Rebecca's presentation was about the IBCP but there were clear links, information and ideas for the PYP and MYP. Travelling so far around the world and meeting with so many cultures and nations made the world feel a smaller and friendlier place.'

Attending the IB global conference has put the English education system and related foci for our community in perspective with the rest of the world. We all have barriers, successes and concerns but ultimately want the best education and opportunities for our children. This shared vision allows us to drive our practice forwards and work together to improve the learning experiences of our young people.

Ms McHaran was invited to present a seminar on the IBCP programme, detailing the innovative methods at Leigh Academies Trust schools that have introduced the CP to support other schools globally in doing the same. There were more CP presentations at this years IB Global Conference than ever before, with worldwide student numbers projected to double in the next year alone. This incredible growth is further supported by increased recognition of the programme by universities, with representatives from King's College London and Yale Universities speaking at the conference on the value of an IB education and what makes an IB student special.

Ms McHaran said 'by embracing the IBCP quickly, Leigh Academies Trust has ensured we are at the forefront of this exciting programme both within the *IB* community and in conversations we were able to have with representatives from higher education and employment sectors at the conference. Attending a conference at a global level has allowed us to pursue new ways to develop all of our IB programmes which we can bring back to our colleagues across the trust. It has also allowed us to begin to develop meaningful partnerships with other IB World Schools which can only continue to enrich the experience of our students and further the expertise of our staff.

Thanks to our recent Erasmus+ grant from The British Council and The European Commission of over €70,000, we are in the fortunate position at The Halley Academy to ensure further staff can benefit from this experience by attending the 2020 IB Global Conference in The Hague next year.

We look forward to sharing with you all of the events, partnerships and opportunities that arise from this conference over this academic year and beyond.

Research shows that every 5% of school missed is, at a minimum, at least an entire GCSE/BTEC grade lost across every subject by Year 11. Our weekly Tutor Time Treat programme, celebrating the achievement of the tutor group with the highest and/ or most improved weekly attendance, has helped to drive forward standards in this area. As the cumulative attendance of Franklin School for this academic year edges closer to being above the national average for secondary schools, we would like to thank all of your support at home in reinforcing the importance of attendance and punctuality. There is still work to be done in this area for some students, and we look forward in the New Year to continually celebrating the progress of students in this regard.

Every day we are committed to delivering the gold-standard in academic support and pastoral care to all of our students in order to drive forward their success and successful transition into adulthood. Module 2 has brought new challenges to our Year 11 students as they continue on their journey towards their summer examinations. All Year 11 students sat a range of Pre-Public Examinations (PPEs) over Module 2, with exemplary conduct and engagement demonstrated throughout. To support them through this process, the academy ran a series of Breakfast Sessions from 7:30am each morning. All students who attended received a free breakfast and benefited from expert tuition and resources prior to each exam. We will continue to run these in the February PPE series as well as the students summer GCSE examinations

During this module, we have also adapted our intervention programme in response to feedback from students and staff in Module 1. As always, we encourage all students to access this free, expert tuition that runs during after school hours. A copy of this programme has been provided to all students, with a copy also available on our website.

Peer Mentors trained in resilience and mental health

In November 2019 over 30 of our students from Years 10 to 13 were trained in peer mentoring to develop resilience and support positive mental health. Both of the sessions were delivered by Lesley French, who is a celebrated psychologist working for a number of years with the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service and more recently with the Anna Freud National Centre for Children and Families, which is a childrens' mental health charity which has been developing and delivering pioneering mental health care for over 60 years.



The first session was hosted by The Halley Academy and our students welcomed a number of peers from St Paul's Academy. This session explored different types of mental health and contributing and contextual factors towards deteriorating mental health. The second session hosted by St Paul's Academy provided thorough training to The Halley Academy peer mentors to enable them to successfully work with students across the academy who are facing challenging circumstances and feelings.

Research demonstrates that Peer Mentoring can result in improved attitudes towards education, helping with issues in transition and developing students' confidence and resilience. Both mentors and mentees can benefit. (Nelson, 2003; Karcher, 2007; Roach, 2014; Powell, 2016; Blakemore, 2018)

From Module 3 these Peer Mentors will be working with identified students from across all year groups but will also be available during social times for any students who feel they would benefit from a session.

Leigh Academies Trust Conference Filming




In November, we were delighted to be asked to be part of the LAT Conference introductory film for February 2020.
