Student Careers Question Time at The Halley Academy



Year 12 at The Halley Academy attended Student Careers Question Time on Tuesday 10th March. Hosted in the impressive listed hall at the academy, our valued guest panelists were:

- Wayne Wilson, Network Manager of KATO and previously a professional footballer
- Dr Joan Wales, Head of Safety and Operational Risk at BP
- Tom Milner, Director of the Natural Resources Investment Banking Group
- Gabriella Belgrave, Forensic Accountant at KPMG

Run along the lines of the popular BBCTV programme, Question Time, students were given biographies of our guests beforehand to give them time to consider the types of questions that they would like to ask.

These included:

- What questions did you ask yourself before starting your career?
- What is the one thing you learnt from your chosen career and would you change anything?
- What advice would you give to your teenage self?
- What is the basic and highest wage in your field?
- What was your motivation to succeed in the area you did?
- What advice would you give a student who hasn't made up their mind what to do as a career/university?

Panelists gave comprehensive answers, with several key tenets running through the advice that they gave, such as, it's not always about salary but rather about finding work rewarding and stepping up to the mark.

Students thanked our guests at the end of the panel session with a loud burst of applause. We are most grateful to our panelists, most of whom are regular supporters of The Halley Academy with Gabriella and Joan being Governors and Tom and Joan also being STEM mentors at the academy. Take the Lead

Sixth Form students in Hawking School at The Halley Academy have been participating in the <u>Take the Lead</u> programme since February. This is a free scheme from The Old Vic theatre company aimed at supporting young people to develop the essential transferable skills necessary in order to succeed at university or in the workplace. Students currently following the IBCP pathway felt a strong resonance between their Personal & Professional Skills syllabus and the programme's focus on building communication, problem-solving and teamwork skills, as well as self-management and self-belief.

The programme included free tickets to see Daniel Radcliffe perform in The Old Vic's production of Endgame by Samuel Beckett, and students then drew on this experience to consider how they might use posture, body language and tone of voice in a professional situation.

Following this, students worked closely with arts professionals and representatives from the world of business to build a theatre company, plan a production, produce an elevator pitch and hone their interview skills. They then came together with participants from other schools and colleges to celebrate their achievements and showcase their skillsets.

Students have been really positive about the programme, and the team of facilitators from The Old Vic described their pride and pleasure at watching students grow in confidence as they progressed through the sessions.

We have really relished this experience and look forward to working closely with The Old Vic again in the future.

This year, our transition plans were dramatically altered as a result of the current times. However, our students were still introduced to The Halley Academy in a variety of ways. Firstly, we established our transition website, which allowed for all of our students to access information about the academy and to meet the small school that will be so important to the pastoral support and learning journey of our students whilst at The Halley Academy.

Individual videos were made for each of our small schools; Easley, Franklin and Turing and families were contacted in advance, helping to ensure a smooth transition. Following on the success in recent years of our 'Transition Activities Week', all students in the penultimate week of the summer term, were introduced through our website, to the

great variety of lessons we are able to offer at the academy; learning to draw a bee in Art to creating a volcano in Geography.

This academic year, we are continuing to offer transition information through virtual means and on our website, you will be able to access a 360° tour of the academy, as well as our film, that introduces new students and families to some of our staff and most importantly the views of our students.

STEM Club



The STEM club continues to grow in strength as we embark on new projects. Last academic year was a successful one up until the incidence of the Coronavirus. We saw an increase in numbers with keen interest shown by students in Years 7 and 8.

Just like most groups we have adapted to hosting our sessions virtually by creating a Google Classroom where fun, engaging experiments which are safe and easy to do at home are uploaded. The classroom code is mig4g4d.

Currently the STEM team are developing a Halley STEM policy and Scheme of Work which will complement the constituent subjects, and give the students the opportunity to expand their knowledge beyond the normal curriculum.

We are also developing a regular newsletter to promote the club's activities, and to enhance the students' experience of STEM in the real world – watch this space!

MyON

In June of this year, The Halley Academy joined forces with MyON - a new online reading platform that will allow our students access to thousands of enhanced digital books. MyON provides essential support and resources, as well as promoting a love of reading and literacy. All students now have login details:

- Username: 1st letter of first name followed by first 4 letters of last name, e.g. John Smith =JSMIT (if it isn't working, please try with a '1' added to the end).
- Password: abc

MyON will form part of our Academy literacy strategy, allowing students to have access to a personalised literacy platform which will match students with books that will complement their interests and reading level. Our students will have access to over 7000 digital books and curated news articles all year round. Almost all of these books are also quizzable on Accelerated Reader, so Year 7-9 students can also be working towards their home learning reading goal of 15-20 minutes every day.

MyON also features an audio function, so words, sentences, or pages can be read to them. Also, the MyOn daily news can be translated into French or Spanish, to support students with English as an additional language and those studying Languages at GCSE. Let's get reading!

Numeracy News

Every year The Halley Academy participates in the UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge, and this year 50 of our best mathematicians from Year 9 to Year 11 took part.



The UKMT individual Maths Challenges are exciting multiple choice question papers, which are designed to encourage mathematical reasoning,

precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. There are three levels of challenge covering the secondary school range - 11-18 - and together they attract thousands of entries from several schools and colleges in the UK.

Once again our students' achievements speak for themselves; 3 of our students qualified for the follow-on round. We also achieved 11 bronze, 5 silver and 2 gold certificates, as well as 3 best in year group and 1 best in school certificate.

During the lockdown our Year 7 and Year 8 students participated in the Junior Maths Challenge. This was set up and run remotely and our students once again rose to the challenge and did brilliantly in the competition.

The Halley Academy Social Action Group's New Campaign to Tackle Climate Change

As you may be aware, The Halley Academy Social Action Group has been standing up for justice and equality on issues that matter most to them. Gender violence and now climate change - The Halley Academy Social Action Group tackles deep rooted inequalities and concerns, with hopes of building a better future for all.



The Social Action Group doesn't stand alone. Next to 200 other Citizens UK organisations across London, The Halley Academy students have been planning to push mayoral candidates to make commitments on the issues that matter most to them. Housing and homelessness, welcome and integration, living wage, youth violence and safety, and the climate emergency are at the top of our list.

The Halley Academy Social Action Group is made up of 13 students, 5 members of staff and one parent, and meet weekly to identify and discuss ways in which we can tackle climate change at the academy and the wider community.

Once things return to normal, you can become involved by joining the Social Action Group every week where we will be busy developing and planning our campaign, which includes: a Year 7 poetry anthology, details of our manifesto and campaign journey, and The Halley Academy Pledge Tree which will be situated in the reception for students, staff and visitors to write their pledges to tackle climate change on a leaf and attach to the tree.

As soon as we can, we will be sending out information about the dates and times when we are meeting. We look forward to seeing you there!





The Halley Academy Social Action Group - Law Review Update

In January 2018, The Halley Academy Social Action Group embarked on their first campaign to make misogyny and violence towards women and girls a hate crime. Since then, they have shared their stories with members of Citizens UK across London, taken part in accountability assemblies, met and challenged local and city wide politicians, delivered anti-bullying and respect workshops at the Royal Borough of Greenwich anti-bullying conference,

and even facilitated misogyny workshops with the Greenwich Police Cadets.

More recently, their dedication and passion towards this relevant and important campaign has resulted in the group contributing to and winning a law review, and achieving the commissioning of an official and detailed report.

The report loudly and clearly recommends the uniform adoption of misogyny as a hate crime across all police forces in England and Wales, as well as training and greater accountability for institutions responsible for safety in public spaces.

On hearing this news one of the former members of the Social Action Group, Faridah, stated:

'My time as part of the SAG was truly invaluable; it really helped me mature as a person. I really benefited from the time spent with everyone at Citizens UK and the social action group. I made lasting relationships and skills that I still use today. The Halley Academy Social Action Group made me believe that my voice could be heard and has encouraged me to keep speaking out about injustice in the world. For the confidence it gave me, I will forever be thankful!
